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GOVERNMENT DELIVER HISTORIC BUDGET

The TSR government has submitted their Budget to the House, for only the second time in the HOC's seven year history.

The Budget, primarily written by TSR's Chancellor, Jarred, was largely centred around cutting both individual and corporation taxes and also featured significant spending cuts to some government departments. It also focused on reducing the national budget deficit, mirroring the approach of that the government's real life counterpart.

Although some MPs expressed support for the Budget's sweeping tax cuts, others were concerned about the nature of the spending cuts outlined by the Chancellor.

The Chancellor did receive near unanimous praise for writing the Budget, however, with one MP commentating that the Bill was "long overdue".

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Chancellor's Budget Report

We've had a busy summer this year, we're all used to the bills, but two speakership elections, the by-election, the suspension of an MP guilty of malpractice and then of course the second only ever Budget Report in TSR history - well that's pretty darn eventful.

As Chancellor of the Exchequer, I was responsible for putting the latter one of those events into action, the Budget, and it is that which I'll be discussing today.

part of running a company, and we made sure to send a message to the world that the UK is the place to do business, which can only help us all – everyone from shareholders to workers, more profits means more investing back into the company and that means more jobs and better products.

Ultimately profits are the most important

I was thinking at first that a Budget would be pointless and we should just write a bill, but then I realised I was in cloud cuckoo land. I think it's nice to give a bit of variation to the House. We get bills all the time, but having a Budget gave everyone a chance to discuss economics (normally perceived as dry) in a slightly more interesting and varied setting, and also gave us all a chance to emulate more of the processes of the real HoC, which is ultimately what we're supposed to do here, right? I think having it as a Budget Report sort of acted as a catalyst for discussion, there was quite a big response to it, that was nice to see, so I deem it a success in that respect.

Now, we just need to get as many of our budget plans into law as soon as possible and will release these over the course of this parliament through a number of bills. Our plans have been delayed slightly by the revelation of a Libertarian bill, which thankfully takes on our VAT abolition proposal and so we've decided to second that, and wait for the outcome because it changes what we can do slightly (due to the increased commitment to the RI). After that's hopefully passed, we'll move forward with our other tax plans and back them up with our spending plans.

We want to keep the Budget deficit below £90bn but are not afraid of adding a bit to the current TSR deficit which stands at about a third less than that. It is important to point out that the deficit from our Budget, whilst a few billion greater than the current TSR deficit, is still a decent amount lower than the real life UK deficit target for this financial year.

So long as we're below £90bn then I'm happy, it means we've still managed to cut a quarter of the deficit away since last year, and our pro-growth measures are worth more than a few billion on the deficit anyway. If we were in stronger times I'd want balance within a single year, but right now we have to play a balancing act (no pun intended).

That means sticking to the real life Coalition plans to cut the deficit quickly, whilst still introducing a

number of pro-growth measures such as VAT abolition and income tax cuts.

Do that, and we get prosperity *through* austerity. Then of course we need to get through our shake-up of governmental departmental structure. Right now we have big government telling us how to live our lives and spending our money as a result, and it is time that we roll that back, and let freedom prevail once more, to completely redefine what government even means, and what role it needs to play in our lives.

Do we need a department for sport and art? Or can those things prosper on their own without the corrupting hand of the state, just as they did before the John Major years? Who should be in control of your destiny?

I'd say; you. I hope with this Budget that we made the first step towards that.

TEHFRANCE (CONSERVATIVE MP)
